BACKGROUND

Texas Parks & Wildlife Department ("TPWD") administers the Texas Recreation & Parks Account Local Park Grant Program ("TRPA") and the Large County and Municipality Recreation and Parks Account (Urban Account) and manages 95 State parks, natural areas and historical sites in Texas. TPWD has separate accounts in their general revenue fund referred to as the TRPA and Urban Account for the purpose of providing matching grants to political subdivisions for parks and recreation projects, and for outreach grants to introduce new populations to outdoor experiences.

RESOLUTION NO. Draft

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF GARLAND, TEXAS, SUPPORTING LEGISLATION THAT PROVIDES A FAIR AND EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION OF THE SPORTING GOODS SALES TAX REVENUE FOR LOCAL AND STATE PARKS; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE

WHEREAS, the development of parks encourages and promotes public health, economic development, job creation, education; corporate relocations, an improved quality of life, and juvenile crime prevention;

WHEREAS, funds are needed for major repairs at Local and State parks and for the acquisition and development of parks and facilities;

WHEREAS, the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department ("TPWD") administers the Texas Recreation & Parks Account Local Park Grant Program ("TRPA") and the Large County and Municipality Recreation and Parks Account (Urban Account) and manages 95 State parks, natural areas and historical sites in Texas;

WHEREAS, TPWD has separate accounts in their general revenue fund referred to as the TRPA and Urban Account for the purpose of providing matching grants to political subdivisions for parks and recreation projects, and for outreach grants to introduce new populations to outdoor experiences;

WHEREAS, the matching grants provided by the TPWD are utilized for the planning, acquisition, and development of local park, recreation and open space areas to be owned and maintained by political subdivisions;

WHEREAS, funds granted to political subdivisions under the TRPA and Urban Account guidelines have funded 1,668 projects of the 3,525 submitted over 30 years delivering over \$800 million to the local Texas economy;

WHEREAS, political subdivisions throughout the State of Texas depend on grants from TPWD through the TRPA to stimulate the acquisition and development of parks and recreational areas for the benefit and enjoyment of their citizenry;

WHEREAS, the TRPA, Urban Account, and State parks are funded from sales tax on sporting goods and that the development of new parks stimulates the purchase of sporting goods;

WHEREAS, the TRPA, Urban Account, and State parks are partially funded from federal dollars used for parks, recreation, open space, trails, and tourism from the United States Department of the Interior Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF), the Sport

Fish Restoration Boat Access program and the United States Department of Transportation Recreation Trails;

WHEREAS, the maintenance and improvements of parks and historic sites and the addition of new parks is a priority to Texans due to the State's expanding population and extensive tourism industry; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of this City Council that a copy of this resolution be presented to the Governor of Texas and the leadership of the 85th Texas Legislature.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARLAND, TEXAS:

Section 1

That the City of Garland is supportive of the legislative efforts to provide a fair and equitable distribution of the sporting goods sales tax revenue for Local and State parks and that all funding for TRPA and Urban Account projects be subject to the established TPWD competitive scoring system.

Section 2

That this Resolution shall be and become effective immediately upon and after its adoption and approval.

ISSUE

Council is requested to consider accepting a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) – Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) – Impaired Driving Mobilization (IDM) Grant.

OPTIONS

- 1. Accept TxDOT STEP Grant Funding. If the City Council concurs, the City Manager will execute the contract.
- 2. Do Not Accept TxDOT STEP Grant Funding.

RECOMMENDATION

Unless otherwise directed by Council, this item will be scheduled for formal consideration at the December 13, 2016 Regular Meeting.

BACKGROUND

The Garland Police Department has partnered with The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) for many years by participating in STEP enforcement grants. The purpose of this grant is to save lives and reduce motor vehicle accidents and related injuries by aggressively enforcing the laws of the State of Texas associated with Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) and Driving Under the Influence by Minor (DUI). Enforcement efforts will be focused throughout the City of Garland.

The enforcement activities will also be supplemented by additional public information and education campaigns conducted during the enforcement periods.

CONSIDERATION

The grant for the FY 2016-2017 is in the amount of \$14,055.32. If accepted, TxDOT will reimburse the City of Garland \$9,992.30. The grant requires the City to provide \$4,063.02 in matching funds. This will be accomplished in part through fringe benefits expenditures, indirect costs, and administrative time spent on grant related paperwork. Consequently, the City can satisfy the contractual match requirements without expending any additional funds.






LARs Comparison


